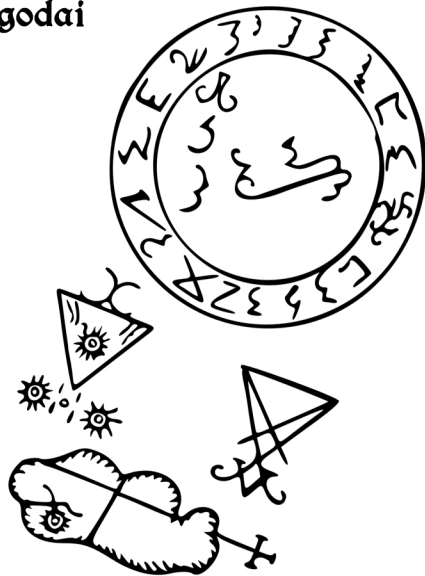

Batanas (Hebrew: שׂוֹן שׂטָן – 'adversary, 'accuser, 'slanderer'; Greek: Ζατάν and Satanas; Arabic: شيطاني Shaytani) is, in Christianity, Judaism, and Islam, one of the angels who rebelled against God and led other angels into rebellion, becoming the main cause of evil in the world. He is most often regarded as the highest-ranking demon, the leader of all evil spirits. In rabbinic tradition, he is given the epithet "the ugly one."

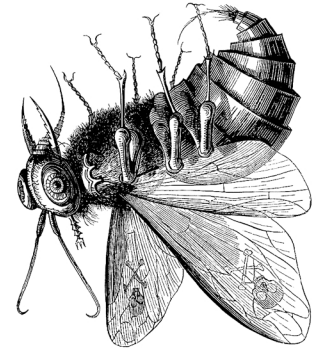

Asmodeus (also Azmodan) is a demon, a fallen angel mainly known from the deuterocanonical Book of Tobit. References to him can be found in demonology and in some Talmudic legends, where he likely originated from Zoroastrianism. Before his fall, he belonged to the Choir of Seraphim. According to MacGregor Mathers, he is the incestuous child of Tubal-Cain and his sister Naamah.

Belial, also known as Beliar, Berial, the Dark Elder, or Albatross (from the Hebrew בְּלִיַּא'ל belijja'al, which combines bli – negation and ja'al – use), is one of the fallen angels (in heaven, he belonged to the Choirs of Virtues and Angels) and one of the four princes of hell (the others being Satan, Lucifer, and Leviathan). He symbolizes the fertility of the earth, independence, and the geographical direction of the north. The literal translation of his name means "one who has no master," "the wicked of the world," "one who rebels," or "worthless."



Beelzebub (Hebrew: בעל זבוב ba'al zavuv, Arabic: إبيظبل إله البعز, Greek: Βεελζεβούβ – literally: lord of flies and gnats, commonly: lord of the flies) is a Semitic name for a demon, the leader of demons. It appears in the Gospel of Luke, in a passage where the Jews (Pharisees and scholars) accuse Jesus of casting out evil spirits by the power of Beelzebub, the ruler of evil spirits (Luke 11:15). He has also been referred to as the Crimson King or the Antichrist.

Behemoth (Hebrew: תוֹמָה Bəhēmōth, Behemoth, B'hemot "beasts; animals"; Arabic: تومب or توميه Bahīmūth) is the untranslated name of a creature mentioned in the Book of Job, 40:15. Along with Leviathan, it is portrayed as a being that demonstrates the greatness and creative power of Yahweh in contrast to Job. It is depicted as a figure resembling a hippopotamus or an elephant.
